

2. 😢 We come from varying religious & political backgrounds. Remember: 'In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity.'

3. 🚫 Avoid commentaries or study notes in your Bible - do your own thinking. Trust God, pray, ask for wisdom then read and answer on your own.

4. 💔 We're all learning. Be gracious and patient with yourself and with others. No one has it all figured out.

5. 🖓 🖞 This is a Bible study - not a personal-opinion group. So, there are going to be "right" and "wrong" answers in keeping with the truth of God's Word.

6. • Share or Listen. You don't have to share, but if you did the reading and responded to that prompt, why not chime in? We all benefit from one another's thoughts and questions. I bet you have something great to share!

7. 🙆 Done or Not Done...Come. Didn't finish the study this week? That's ok. Life gets busy. You're here! Yay, you! This will be a good week for you to listen and be encouraged by others.

8. X Be considerate. Share your thoughts on questions you completed and allow time for others to do the same - limit yourself to about 2 minutes maximum and try to stay on topic. Your group leader will help with that.

9. 🙏 Pray. Pray when you arrive, while you're in Grace Groups, during teaching time. Pray for your understanding to grow. Pray for your Grace Group leaders. Pray for one another. Let's be women who go to the Father for one another and seek His face together.

... My Heart to Yours ...

"I have my rights!" She yelled defiantly in my face. She stood her ground, stared wildly at me, and insisted again, "I can do it if I want - I. Know. My. Riiiights!!!" She was correct. I knew that. She had rights. Don't we all know that? Aren't we as Americans filled with this foundational reality of our national identity from our earliest age? Our nation was birthed literally on the demand for rights. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights." "We the people, in order to form a more perfect union..." demand our rights!

In light of this, I found myself challenged as I read this portion of the Bible. Frequently I felt a tug – honestly a tugof-war really from my own sense of rights - rights I have as an American and rights I experience because of my freedom in Christ. I know I'm not a slave any more to sin. I know Christ died to set me free and make me

victorious even over death. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me and I am not even bound by laws in the Torah that would keep me from eating or drinking anything I want. I am free! As an American I have rights listed for me in a document that has established not only this great nation but has been the inspiration for every freedom-loving new nation since 1776. I can drive, vote, live, own, work, and play essentially any way I choose. What a blessing! What a privilege! And what a resistance when I feel that someone may be moving in on my rights! Like a child clutching a precious toy, I cling to my rights. Fear and panic can come over me if those rights feel threatened. Frustration and indignation can fill me if someone moves in on my space where I keep my rights close by.

So, when faced with a screaming, rights-demanding, person, these truths flashed through my mind, and I really related to her...and then I chuckled. I looked at her - actually, I got on my knees and looked closely in her red eyes, and said to this little five-year-old, "Yes, sweetie, you have rights. And right now, you can sit and think about how to best use them." She had hit another child who was also standing next to me, clutching my arm, shaking in tears. I walked with both girls over to the "Time-Out" spot, sat the red-faced one down to calm herself and held the wounded one in my arms. At what cost did this little girl express her "rights?" At the cost of harming the other girl who 5 minutes ago was her bestie-best friend. Time-Out did the trick and the rights-demanding girl gathered herself and made it right with her friend. I walked them both back out to the swings to play in peace. That moment gave me pause to reflect on my personal sense of rights – I wouldn't hit a friend – but in my need to demand what I feel like I deserve, could I harm her? Could my clinging to rights wound someone? Yes. Of course, it could. Instead, I can surrender my rights for the sake of love and loving my neighbor and friends. It's because of Christ who "did not consider equality with God something to be grasped" that I am free, and it is because of what He did for me, laying down His life – His rights - that I can follow His example and do everything for God's glory and not for the pleasure of my own rights.

Acts 15:13, 19-20 – Who is giving the response? _____ What decision did he state would be done about Gentiles who turn to God? (4 things)


4. What the Corinthians Were Saying. Notice the phrase in quotes in 8:1. This indicates Paul is quoting what the Corinthians had written in their letter to him. Write what they had written about:

What were they writing that they claimed to have "all knowledge" about?

- 5. All Puffed Up and No Place to Go. What sins/s does Paul connect to the "knowledge" that the Corinthians claimed having? Carefully read 8:1-2 for what is clearly stated as well as what sin issues can be inferred. Read this passage from other translations (ESV, NET, NIV, NLT, etc.) and note below which translation brings clarity to you:
- 6. Close to Home. Think of an example from your own life to illustrate Paul's point about the effects of knowledge versus love.
- 7. I don't think you know what you think you know...What is the first step in a Christian knowing as she ought to know? Consider 8:2-3 along with the following: James 3:13-18, 4:10; 1 John 4:7-11; 4:20-5:3.



8. Living in Love & Light. How would it look in your life this week if you radically applied living with love's priority?

- 5. Heading in the Right Direction? Considering where they were and where they are now in their spiritual understanding, are the Corinthians on the right track in their understanding of God? How so or not? What had been their understanding before coming to Christ about idols and the existence of gods? Although Athens was more known for intellectual reasoning than Corinth, Paul's experience in Athens is helpful to give us some understanding. Read Acts 17:22-31.
- 6. Many gods? Many lords? What does Paul say about the existence of gods and lords in 8:5? Is Paul saying that there exist many gods and lords? Support your answer with scripture.
- 7. One God. One Lord. What essential knowledge is missing for some? (8:7a) What is our relationship to God the Father? To the Lord, Jesus Christ? Notice the connection Paul makes with our existence and purpose. (8:6) Read from several translations for clarity.
- 8. Superior Knowledge and Spiritual Disaster. What is Paul's big concern with the Corinthians, their knowledge, and how they are using it? Who is Paul especially concerned about? Summarize 8:8-11. How does Paul's concern reflect the heart of God?
- 9. Wounding the Weak or a Willing Witness. What is Paul willing to do? Why? Read 8:12-13 together with <u>Romans</u> <u>14:1-2, 12-13 and 15:1</u>. Would you be willing to do the same? Why or why not?

How does this commitment connect back to his mission he stated in 1 Cor. 2:2? How is his life an example to you today?



10. Living in Love and Light. Am I building up or being puffed up? Connect 1 Cor. 8:1b and 8:13 and consider how you can live in the true love and light of your calling with this truth in mind.

5. Don't Muzzle an Ox? Look closely at the right Paul is asserting he has and what this right is based on in 9:7-14. What right is Paul teaching the Corinthians that he – like all other apostles - has?



Paul gives defenses based on several principles like custom, law, even Christ's teaching for why expecting to be paid is acceptable. Make note of those reasons in 9:7-12a and 13-14

v. 7-8 Examples from secular life...

v. 9-11 Example from Jewish law...

In this example, Paul asks (9:9b-10) then answers (9:10b-11) his own question. What hope do the plowman and the thresher expect? What does this tell you about the nature of God?

v. 13 Example from temple





στέφανος "stef-an-os"" That which surrounds, a crown; refers to a wreath or garland of honor and victory, also used to describe the "crown" of thorns on Jesus' head at His crucifixion.

Like a Gentile-outside the law... 1 Cor. 9:21; Acts 17:22, 22:1-2; Galatians 2:11- (This is an example from correction as he admonishes Cephas for his hypocritical living)

Like a "weak" person... 1 Cor. 9:22, 1 Corinthians 8:9-12 (Recall that Paul considers Christians who are not mature in their faith to be "weak" but Paul is willing to be an example to them as well. Note that example here.)





Corporations have them.

Small businesses, non-profits, schools, even churches have them too - a vision and mission statement. Organizations create vision and mission statements to clarify their purpose for existing, to keep their purpose focused, and to communicate to the world why they do what they do. Then they add a strategy that support where they're going and how they've defined why they exist.

Stating a vision and mission and laying out a strategy is a powerful way to clarify your focus, You don't have to be a corporation to have one. With a vision and mission strategy plan you can keep yourself from overcommitment and stay involved with what is most helpful and most importantly: in line with your calling in Christ.

Many people move through life getting up, taking care of the day's tasks, dealing with issues and basic needs, planning a vacation or a play date here and there, heading to bed and doing that over and over again. Having a vision with a mission and a strategy will tighten up your life's focus, help you to keep things on track with what you've been called to be and do and give you the specifics to help you stay focused with what's most important in life as a Christian.

Vision is the picture of where you're headed - you can see it there as you imagine looking to your future - who you are

becoming, what you see yourself doing, where you are going.


Mission is the actions you'll take to move toward your vision.

Strategies are specific things - often daily or weekly - you'll do with your mission to get to that vision.

- 1) **Read** chapters one through ten and highlight key verses that point to ultimate truths for your life many of these are in the verses you've been memorizing in each lesson.
- 2) Think about how this will help you personally...If you are raising children, how will this help your family? Wives, how will this impact your marriage? What impact can this have on your friendships and work relationships?
- 3) **Consider** adding **GOALS**. Goals are specific accomplishments you'll plan that will support your strategies and importantly: they have a deadline.
- 4) Write a vision, vision, and strategy for your own life with these verses in mind. EXAMPLE: If your vision for your life is to " do all for the glory of God," your mission might be to "Mature in my faith, live unselfishly, and reach out to people who don't know Jesus." Your strategies might include attending Bible study, have an accountability partner, set aside daily time in God's Word. Then a goal would be, "By December 1 I will have completed each day of Bible study." Or "At the end of the year I will have three Bible verses memorized." Or " I will meet with my study buddy once a week."
- 5) **Remember**, Goals support the strategies and have a deadline. Strategies support your mission and your mission is what moves you toward your vision.

As always, Create & Share is a great time to bring friends or your family together to get into God's Word and talk this through! Create, share, and dwell in God's word together! Keep in mind the specific things you've learned from this past lesson and let those truths help you write your vision, mission, and strategies.
